Humans are not the only creatures that communicate. Many other animals exchange signals and signs that help them find food, migrate, or reproduce, and this ensures their survival. For example, elephants emit very low-pitched sounds, below the level of human hearing, that call other members of the herd over many miles. Chimpanzees use facial expressions and body language to express dominance or affection with each other. Whales and dolphins make vocal clicks, squeals, or sing songs to exchange information about feeding and migration, and to locate each other. Insects regularly use pheromones, a special kind of hormone, to attract mates.

Humans have developed more complex systems of language that are used not only to ensure survival, but to express ideas and emotions, to tell stories and remember the past, and to negotiate with one another. They also created the written form, which began with drawings or marks made to indicate meaningful information about the world. Thirty thousand-year-old cave paintings that have been discovered in France, for example, illustrate Ice Age animals, while 15,000-year-old counting marks have been found on reindeer antlers, perhaps to record the cycles of the moon.
