Stuyvesant was born in 1592 in the Netherlands. He was appointed director of several Dutch colonies in the Caribbean, but severely injured his right leg during an expedition, therefore wore a wooden leg throughout his life. In 1646, he became the director general of all Dutch possessions in North America and the Caribbean and arrived in New Amsterdam, present-day New York City, in 1647.

As much as he was despised among the public for being a rather authoritarian figure, he had also greatly contributed to New York. During his 18 year-old rule over the colony, the population expanded from 2,000 to 8,000, and he improved trade within the region. He also established a sense of law and order in the community, which was indispensable for New York since it was composed of various cultures and backgrounds.

I remember several buildings and street names in New York that were named after him, like Stuyvesant Plaza. He is a frequently discussed figure in history classes especially in New York State. Anyways, that is all for today! See you next time!
